



About The Open University

- The OU is the largest academic institution in the UK and a world leader in flexible distance learning. Since it began in 1969, the OU has taught more than 1.5 million students.
- The OU teaches over one-third of all part-time undergraduate students at UK higher education institutions each year.
- The OU has been one of the top three UK universities for student satisfaction in the National Student Survey every year since the survey began in 2005.
- The OU's academic provision is regularly reviewed by the Quality Assurance Agency for Higher Education. The 2009 Institutional Audit resulted in judgements of confidence in the soundness of the University's management of both academic standards and quality of learning opportunities.
- Over 70% of OU students are in full-time or part-time employment, and four out of five FTSE 100 companies have sponsored staff to take OU courses.
- Nearly 20% of OU undergraduates in the UK live in the 25% most deprived areas.
- 15% of new OU undergraduates in 2009/10 were aged under 25.
- The OU supports a vibrant research portfolio, conducted in the UK and in partner institutions around the world. In the UK's latest Research Assessment Exercise (RAE 2008), the University climbed 23 places to 43rd, making the OU one of the UK's fastest-rising research universities.
- Research funding from grants increased by more than 10% between 2008/09 and 2009/10, from £15.4 million to £17.0 million.
- In 2008, the OU was the first UK university to join iTunes U and has since become the first university to reach 30 million downloads of its material.
- The OU is the largest European provider of content on YouTube Edu, and the OU's OpenLearn web site is the UK's largest source of free university learning materials, with over 14 million unique visitors since 2006.
- The Open University's Teacher Education in Sub-Saharan Africa (TESSA) programme has successfully contributed to training 430,000 primary school teachers in 13 countries.
- In 2010 the OU became one of The Sunday Times' Best Places to Work in the Public Sector.
