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# **British Council Literary Search**

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The aim of this document is to outline a non-exhaustive list of the resources available about the cultural activates of the British council from the 1950s to the present day. The search is comprised of academic books; journals articles and papers that are mainly about or even partly concern the British Councils cultural activities. Disciplines of particular interest are: the Social Sciences, Humanities, Politics and International Relations (especially sub branches of diplomacy, cultural diplomacy or public diplomacy). The search also includes non-academic publications such as newspaper articles and parliamentary papers. The search was carried out using specific key word sets. Examples of the keywords used include: "cultural projects," "arts," "cultural exchange," "cultural diplomacy," "cultural value," "information services," "soft power" and "counterpoint."

While the lead user method has been demonstrated to be very effective, challenges remain around the sustainability of such an approach, particularly on a large-scale. A possible mediating tool that might be able to efficiently leverage communities of lead users is the eTM eParticipation tool. Findings from eight case studies show that the eTM has had a positive effect on appropriation and engagement of lead users as well as providing users benefits such as enhanced peer learning, and there is potential to extrapolate to innovation activities.

This provides my starting point for an investigation into the historical origins of black South African engagement with Shakespeare. I present new evidence on the first recorded performances of Shakespeare by black South Africans – at the Anglican 'Kafir Institution' in Grahamstown (Eastern Cape) in the 1860s and 1870s. He used his 'genetic method' to investigate higher cognitive processes in historical context. These insights are foundational to sociocultural theory, which is widely used in education research. However, since Vygotsky, communicative globalization has changed the conditions of theorization, research, policy and practice. Global convergence is characterized by extensive and intensive flows of people, messages, knowledge, ideas and money, and sudden, multiple and disjunctive changes. Educational activity is 'global' activity, shaped simultaneously in global, national and local spheres. This article argues that nevertheless, once developed to incorporate global phenomena into the genetic method and the notion of mediating artefacts, Vygotsky's ideas have much to offer the analysis of globally affected educational practices. This conceptual approach combines the spatial insights of globalization theory with the socio-historical relational understandings enabled by the genetic method. It is illustrated by a case study on the learning to teach English practices of a cohort of Vietnamese pre-service teachers during their practicum. Global flows, media and artefacts, which are used extensively by these teachers, articulate with national and local practices and conventions in innovative ways.

Ceibal administration believes that it is imperative to introduce English as a Foreign Language in primary education through the use of new modes of teaching which incorporate the OLPC XO laptop as a tool for learning engagement and democratisation. Uruguay has secured funds for a project based on blended learning which integrates remote teaching through videoconferencing, the use of a learning management system, and professional development. Plan Ceibal seeks to demonstrate that lessons delivered by remote teachers via videoconferencing with support from classroom teachers (CTs) with very limited or no command of English can facilitate successful learning outcomes in learners and CTs. Data related to their life, attitudes and cultural dispositions are discussed under four different states, namely, Adaptation, Drifting in Global Comfort, Drifting in Global Discomfort and Bitter/Sweet Home. Together, these contribute to their mobility pattern – the Global Drift. This article presents a sub-study of ELLiE that investigates the impact of out-of-school factors on learners' listening and reading skills in year four of formal FL instruction. More specifically, we include parents' educational level, parents' use of the FL professionally, exposure, interaction and cognate linguistic distance. Data were collected by means of listening and reading tests and a parents' questionnaire. Results of the statistical analyses show that cognate linguistic distance was the strongest predictor of both listening and reading scores, followed closely by exposure, and parents' FL use at work and international interaction at some distance. Parents' educational levels only impacted on reading scores, and domestic interaction did not have any effect on listening or reading. Furthermore, the results confirm previous research on young learners' incidental FL acquisition through watching subtitled films, as watching films was the most powerful exposure type for both listening and reading. Parents' use of FL at work correlated significantly with exposure, indicating that the influence of parents would have an effect on the opportunities for their children's FL exposure.

The data were collected from 40 primary schools over three years using a mixed method research design, including observation of lessons and interviews with teachers and headteachers, and focus group discussions with children. Questionnaires were also administered to children across Key Stage 2 (years 7–11). Findings indicate that the cultural dimension in languages teaching is considered important but, while this is clearly

					articulated by headteachers and teachers, it is rarely planned for systematically. Without a shared understanding of how to achieve the deeper aspects of cultural learning, their vision of developing respect for multiculturalism, broadening cultural horizons and promoting global citizenship remains only partially realised. While the cultural dimension is referenced within lessons, there are limited opportunities for children to question, explore or reflect upon the impact of <b>Culture</b> either on their own lives or on the lives of others. It is a very specific case study of international knowledge flows. The broad question of whether these resulted from a consciously rational learning process or were a more culturally constructed exercise in 'imaginative geography' informs the empirical investigation. This focuses on the evolving political context for Anglo-Soviet planning contacts, the shifting motivations for seeking Soviet knowledge and the evolving balance of resultant relationships. The important role of a

					'friendship organisation', the Society for Cultural Relations with the USSR, is examined. From 1955, the <b>British Council</b> created a new basis for contact that was less sympathetic to Soviet ideals. Many specific instances of planning connections are identified, especially visits in the 1930s and during the 'Khrushchev thaw' in the 1950s. Overall, predominantly Utopian 1930s' views of Soviet urban planning changed towards more critical and negative views. Throughout, however, even the most sympathetic architects and planners retained some critical detachment and never proposed direct copying of Soviet planning models. The main impact for British planning was as a vast case study of the virtues of a bold, comprehensive and state-led approach.

Whilst international work is perceived to be politically motivated and diplomatically advantageous, it can be highly beneficial to cultural institutions. In this paper, 'cultural diplomacy' is shown to be a strategy used by museums to enable organisational development and economic growth. This paper demonstrates how national museums adopted a political rhetoric and used strategic lobbying to formulate a new cultural policy, which expanded the scale and scope of their international work. By defining the parameters and principles of this policy, the institutions wield power, thus challenging the conventional perceptions of policy-making and contradicting commentators who accuse museums of political subservience. The love and idealisation of an 'imagined' England constructed from literary texts, and the encounter with reality upon travel to England, are depicted in many fictional and autobiographical accounts. Instead, ethnic strategies are mobilized with regard to the choice of ancestral languages in the definition of self, in the controversy over national languages, and in the educational system. The second part discusses the potential of Kreol as a national language and as a vehicle of ethnic co-operation and national ideology. The complex and ambivalent attitudes to Kreol prevalent in different segments of the Mauritian population are discussed in detail, as well as the part played by Kreol in the radical nationalist movement of the 1970s, and the interrelationship between language and ethnicity. Finally, a number of recommendations are suggested for further studies of language in ethnicity and nationalism.
