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




• • • Empathy

the first few days after the bomb


just thinking

without much humanity


and I wanted to meet him

and discover his humanity


later on also came the idea that I wanted him

• • • Metaphor analysis

- o find all metaphors
- o group them together by their metaphorical meanings
- o look for patterns of metaphor use
- interpret the link between metaphor patterns and people's ideas, attitudes and values



- o difficult or critical moments in the talk,
 -- clusters of metaphors
- how speakers think about key topics --'framing' metaphors
- how speakers change their ideas -the movement and changing of metaphors.






