I hope everyone will have the chance to take a break over the summer and get into nature in your local area or beyond. If you are at home, for the rest of July and until 10 August, it is the annual **Big Butterfly Count.** Just 15 minutes in your garden or nearest outdoor space noting which butterflies you see will help researchers, including our own <u>postgraduate researcher and Associate Lecturer</u> Willow Neal.

Find out more here, where you can download a butterfly identifier, access the database to find out about sightings in your local area and sign up to a regular newsletter with tips on how to support our pollinators. This includes pollinator planting and leaving wildflowers to grow and setting aside wild areas in our gardens or allotments. I spotted red admiral and peacock on the buddleia and two large whites very happy on the blackberry flowers. The blackberries are early this year and, despite the lack of rain, very juicy.

After 18 months of hard work, the **Youth Shadow Panel launched their final report** in the Palace of Westminster earlier this month. One of the 14

recommendations for education reform is: Integrated solutions-centred climate change and sustainability content and developing a connection with nature across subjects and key stages.

The Big Student Meet-up

The Big Student Meet-up was held at the Walton Hall campus on Saturday 5 July where a range of stalls and sessions were organised in the Hub Lecture Theatre, Juniper and Medlar Suite and on the Mulberry Lawn. We were so pleased to welcome around 120 students with their friends and families to the meet-up. Sessions included block printing, craft, creative writing, biodiversity tours, walks around the Living Lab and Living Roof and plant propagation.

Colleagues from across the OU and the Student Union set up stalls to chat to students, introduce them to their work and ask their thoughts and opinions. Stalls included Astrobiology, The Centre for Electronic Imaging who brought their space cameras!, Life and Chemical Sciences, Maths and Statistics, Design, Mindapples (mental health service), Student insights, The OU Students Shop and Hedgehog Friendly Campus.

Sustainability was front and foremost in the organising and planning stages prioritising using what we have, buying second hand and ensuring disposable waste was compostable or recyclable.



FASS Scotland nature writing workshops



Dr. Rachel Marsh, an Associate Lecturer who teaches English and Creative Writing, is leading a series of Creative Writing workshops in a Dundee community garden - 'Victoria Garden Writes'. The theme of the workshops is 'biodiversity' and the aim is to engage local community members with the natural world through Creative Writing. The workshops explore the fundamentals of writing and how storytelling intersects with environmental sustainability. Participants at the first workshop enjoyed the garden setting which is thriving at this time of year, with grapes, artichokes, sweet peas, raspberries, and hundreds of other plants which promote biodiversity and support nature and wildlife (see photo montage). The Victoria Garden also runs a community larder where food is on offer to save it from landfill – this includes food grown in the garden and consumer goods saved from becoming supermarket waste. Dundee has an impressive network of 30 community gardens, and this is a wonderful opportunity to showcase how they can benefit individual learning in addition to the well-being and environmental benefits that come with spending time in a garden. The course explores how these traditional landscapes can deliver a range of nature-based solutions that will improve our environment. Produced with financial support from Anglian Water, the authors also consulted with representatives from the Dadima's Community Interest Company, and teachers from Denbigh School in Milton Keynes in selecting course content. Green Gown Awards - Finalists announced

With 97 entries from 59 universities across 29 countries, this year's finalists include two entries from the OU. 
