As with all families, the OU family is experiencing a period of change. The role of Executive sponsor for Sustainability was designed to incorporate such change and to rotate across the OU, benefiting from a range of expertise.

Inaugural sponsor Josie Fraser as Deputy Vice Chancellor responded to academic's concerns and staff requests to embed social and environmental justice across the university. Practically this work took two strands: Equality Diversity and Inclusion in response to the Equality Act and now under the leadership of Professor Al Laville; and Sustainability. Josie organised the October 2019 Climate Emergency Forum, compered by Nick Braithwaite as Executive Dean of STEM. Almost 500 staff were welcomed by Tim Blackman in one of his first events in his new role as VC. Participants gave a clear message that a sustainability function was required to coordinate sustainability activity across the institution.

Chief Finance Officer Paul Traynor took up the Executive sponsor role and commissioned work to review best practice across the sector, validate carbon reporting and environmental compliance for our Estate and operations, to collate evidence of OU sustainability activities and to contribute to COP26, hosted by Glasgow. Sustainability was proposed as an institutional goal in the next OU Strategy. A small Sustainability Office was created to coordinate activity across professional services, Faculties and nations.

With a lot of good practice in STEM, Nick Braithwaite became Executive sponsor and was charged with improving our ranking in People and Planet. Nick consulted to specify the OU Sustainability vision 'to create and share learning and knowledge for social and environmental justice' and the focus for Sustainability delivery in Learn and Live: developing and promoting the curriculum for sustainability; upskilling and reskilling staff so that 'sustainability is everyone's job'; and coordinating a pan-OU matrix team through the Sustainability Office. Accompanied by the establishment of the Sustainability Steering Group, Sustainability Coordination Group and School Sustainability Leads (thanks to Emma Dewberry in STEM) and the development of our Sustainability Planning, Action and Reporting Kit, all teams across the OU can now contribute to this institutional goal and become good ancestors for future generations.

This month the role of Executive sponsor for Sustainability passes once more, this time to Klaus-Dieter Rossade, Executive Dean of WELS. Nick leaves a legacy, including a new tradition, as he quite literally passes the baton in the form of the Wimpey shovel. This miniature metal shovel is symbolic of planting seeds for future generations and a great example of reuse. It's origins date back to the early days on Walton Hall campus when teaching took place in Wimpey huts, before any buildings were finished. The Wimpey shovel was used as an award to schools in STEM in the 1980s and is now finding a new lease of life in the safe hands of the Executive sponsor for Sustainability.

The approach we have adopted at The OU is that 'sustainability is everyone's job' and we are seeing meaningful actions to embed sustainability in all roles and projects, with some creative examples which are also enhancing the quality of our service and the student experience. Fulfilling futures in environment and sustainability

This was the focus for a 6-day online forum for OU environmental science and environmental studies students and those studying any subject interested in potential careers in this innovative, growing sector. Students could join other OU students, alumni, the OU careers team and hear from employers to discover career pathways, how to gain valuable experience and professional training. The forum ran between 6-11 March 2025 and will remain open on a read only basis for 12 months. The top 5 threads were viewed over 440 times and 133 unique students viewed and/or posted on the forum.

Living Roof Live Lab

Thanks to a collaboration with researchers in STEM and a local green roof creator, we are developing a green roof research platform. The initial building blocks of the Living Roof Live Lab were put in place in early February on top of the Stuart Hall building on campus. Later this month further planting and seed laying will take place to make the gardens grow.

The project represents a significant stride towards sustainable urban development and came about as Milton Keynes-based green roof specialists Bridgman & Bridgman and the research team secured Open Societal Challenges (OSC) funding through the Challenge Us! programme. This initiative will contribute to crucial research on the ecological and urban benefits of green roofing technologies. <u>You can read more on the project here</u>

Almost 150 trees planted through Ecosia

Following her Carbon Literacy Training, Avril Moore pledged to champion the tree planting search engine, <u>Ecosia</u>. Currently, each member of staff can select it as their default search engine. After a successful pilot, almost 150 trees were planted by Ecosia following colleagues switching to the search engine. Results of the pilot will be shared with the University Secretary and we hope to join a handful of pioneering universities who have made this their default search engine.

The local Sustainability Working Group spoke to colleagues, along with Dr Victoria Hands and Gabriella Daroczi from the Sustainability Office. The following day, at an all staff Away Day over 120 colleagues took part in sessions on the Five Ways of Working for sustainability, and played the game 'How Bad Are Bananas?', promoting The OU approach to sustainability and the many ways to get involved. A highlight was a lunchtime team walk around a local park and a few minutes spent together in stillness and silence under the Spring sunshine (thanks Anna Elliot for inviting this). It's amazing what a few moments in nature can bring!
